AGU Publications

Publications have been discussed extensively by the AGU Council and identified as a high priority objective in the Strategic Plan. The AGU Board of Directors recently agreed to evaluate partnering with a third party publisher for the production, sales, and marketing of AGU publications. This decision followed a third-party external review, which involved widespread consultation with Council, AGU editors, and the Publications Committee. The decision was based both on scientific and organizational considerations.

In order to ensure that the scientific criteria for evaluating potential partners is well developed, the leadership of all sections and focus groups has been invited to share their input and provide comment on


initial criteria as developed by the AGU Board and Publications Committee. These draft criteria are

- Fit for AGU's mission, scope, and culture.
- Strategic alignment and positioning for the future.
- Author and editor support.
- AGU control and autonomy.
- Expanding AGU's reach.

William Gilbert Award

Nominations for the William



Gilbert Award are due July 31, 2012! The Gilbert Award is the GP Section's highest honor. It is given for excellence in at least one of the following categories: scientific rigor, originality, and impact; leadership and service to the GP research community; development of new cross-disciplinary research areas and methods. This year, as in all alternating years, the Gilbert Award will be presented to a junior researcher either less than 36 years of age on December 31, 2012, or less than 5 years from PhD graduation on that same date. Note: Nominations are not restricted to GP members in tenure-track faculty positions. Early-career scientists in any position, including post-doctoral researchers and other research appointments, are eligible.

Outstanding Student Paper Awards to Blanco, Domeier, and Manning

We are pleased to announce the winners of the Outstanding Student Paper Awards for the 2011 Fall AGU Meeting. GP chose three OSP winners:

- **Dunia Blanco**, University of Alberta: "Siberian apparent polar wander path for the Panerozoic Eon: towards finding Siberian place on Earth"
- Matthew Domeier, University of Michigan: "Reconciling paleomagnetism of Pangea"
- Earl Manning, University of Oklahoma: "An integrated paleomagnetic, rock magnetic, and geochemical study of the Marcellus Shale in the Valley and Ridge Province in Pennsylvania and West Virginia"

The awards included a certificate from AGU and a \$200 stipend from the GP Section. The winners will be introduced at the 2012 GP Business Meeting and Reception, December 2012.

AGU awards nominations

The AGU Council voted in 2011 to align the nomination cycle for AGU Fellows to coincide with all other AGU awards. Nominations for 2013 AGU Fellows and all other 2013 AGU medals and awards will be accepted January 15 through March 15, 2013. The AGU Council also voted to allow Section officers to be nominators, nominees, or writers of supporting letters for AGU Medals and Awards. However, Section officers are not permitted to be nominators, nominees, or writers of supporting letters for AGU Fellow.

Research of our GP members fits well with a number of AGU awards and medals. Please consider nominating your worthy colleagues for these prestigious honors:

- **John Adam Fleming Medal**: original research and technical leadership in geomagnetism, atmospheric electricity, aeronomy, space physics, and related sciences.
- Walter H. Bucher Medal: original contributions to basic knowledge of the crust and lithosphere (given in alternate years).
- William Bowie Medal: outstanding contributions to fundamental geophysics and for unselfish cooperation in research.
- James B. Macelwane Medal: significant contributions to the geophysical sciences by an outstanding young scientist.

Kathy Whaler to present the 2012 Bullard Lecture

Kathy Whaler will present the Bullard Lecture at the 2012 Fall AGU Meeting. Kathy is a professor at the School of Geosciences at the University of Edinburgh and an expert in a wide range of geomagnetic subjects, including crustal magnetization as observed from low-orbit satellites, advective flow of the outer core, and magnetotelluric studies of the crust and upper mantle.
